[Pilate] went again into the judgment hall, and saith unto Jesus, Whence art thou? **But Jesus gave him no answer.** (Jn 19:9)

He'd explained this many times in His ministry. ¹¹ This spiritual principle came into play at its greatest, facing the cross.
