Over the years, I have heard many stories from people who have been rescued from dire circumstances because they heard from the Spirit of the Lord. It wasn't just an arbitrary "this is how we want it" agreement. They sensed in the spirit that this was God's will, and he was healed as they stood in faith. Years later, he was, again, very sick.
