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As a shepherd boy, David knew great victory when he faced Goliath. The Spirit of God leads every Christian who will hear and obey into victory. Certainly not with military might or sword like David or Gideon, but from our knees in prayer. Daniel stood before the Lord for a disobedient nation. His confession was, "We have sinned." He further stated that they had

not obeyed the prophets but had rebelled against God. Then there is my favorite verse, "To the Lord our God belong mercies and forgivenesses." I love this verse because mercy and forgiveness is in the plural tense.

There are many examples of answered prayer in the Scripture. Peter was released from prison through the prayers of the saints.
