I noticed the other day when driving my daughter to work that I spent an awful lot of time looking in the rearview window. I like to think I'm a safe driver, although I know I'm impatient at times, but that day, I realized how unsafe a behavior that was and how much of a habit it'd become.

Throughout the Scriptures, God said to look forward. He told the Israelites to "go forward" into the Red Sea.⁵ He warned Lot's family of the dangers of looking back.⁶ So serious was his wife's mistake that in the New Testament we're told to remember her behavior.⁷

Why? One commentary said of the passage about Lot's wife that to look back increases the DESIRE to return. Think again about the Israelites, who mourned the loss of food they'd eaten in Egypt. They no longer had God's vision as their goal, but instead, DOUBTED His love for them and, as a result, formed a DECEIVED view of the truth.⁸

Their past wasn't as great as it seemed at that moment. Men and women do this with their memories all the time. Suddenly, what was actually a road lined with potholes becomes smooth sailing when viewed through rose-colored glasses. Lot's wife looked back with longing for what God had decided to DESTROY, and because of DISOBE-DIENCE, her DEATH was the result.

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We are sons and daughters of God, carrying the DNA of heaven, eternal life. This is why we sing hallelujah! We have been ransomed. The penalty of sin was paid by the only-begotten Son of God, and now we have God's nature. Our heart is full of wonder. Joyfully we sing of our Redeemer and His loving sacrifice.

WE ARE FORGIVEN!

The memory of our faults and flaws should bring no pain. We *were* guilty. We *are* forgiven. Yesterday, our lifestyle screams, "Don't follow me," but today, we are an example of divine recovery. We may have a story to tell (one we wish we did not ever experience), but our sin and stupidity is FORGIVEN. We may have suffered because of sin. We may have harmed our family and friends. But, never again must we walk downcast and dejected.

The New Living Translation writes that He will never think of them again.² This is the reason, the apostle Paul said we could, "Look forward to what lies ahead."¹ But, we must never forget his Holy Spirit inspired words. "Now that we are on the right track, let's stay on it."⁴ In the Contemporary English Version, we read, "We must keep going in the direction that we are now headed."

We must let these great words of wisdom guide us. God has spoken. We are FORGIVEN and today is a NEW day. Yesterday we bowed our heart at the cross and stood at the empty tomb. Now we sit in the upper room to be empowered as heaven's ambassador and walk a NEW way. Walk, child of God. Keep walking and don't look back.

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years after they looked back. Not because they were lost. Moses had traveled across the Sinai Peninsula when he return from his father-in-law's house. He knew the way, and it was, in fact, a known trade route. No, they wandered around because after all God had done for them, the signs and wonders in front of Pharoah, the parting of the Red Sea, they looked behind, DESIRING to return.⁹

You'd think we wouldn't want what has been so awful, but the devil is a liar and subtle sometimes. He changes the heart of society and we find ourselves not as tough on sin as we used to be. We let popular figures or family members DRAG us away from the straight-and-narrow. **Our focus shouldn't shift.** Jesus looked before Him, and we follow His example.¹⁰ God has provided the shield of faith to protect us as we advance.
